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in this classic work of intellectual history ernst cassirer provides both a cogent synthesis and a penetrating analysis of one of history s greatest intellectual epochs the enlightenment arguing that there was a common foundation beneath the diverse strands of thought of this period he shows how enlightenment philosophers drew upon the ideas of the preceding centuries even while radically transforming them to fit the modern world in cassirer s view the enlightenment liberated philosophy from the realm of pure thought and restored it to its true place as an active and creative force through which knowledge of the world is achieved in a new foreword peter gay considers the philosophy of the enlightenment in the context in which it was written germany in 1932 on the precipice of the nazi seizure of power and one of the greatest assaults on the ideals of the enlightenment he also argues that cassirer s work remains a trenchant defense against enemies of the enlightenment in the twenty first century

the age of the enlightenment has a peculiar interest and value for the student of the history of philosophy the philosophical output of this period is unusually rich and significant embracing as it does the classical writings of locke berkeley hume leibniz rousseau and kant and therefore may well be studied for the material which these separate contributions severally contain but more than this the eighteenth century philosophy is a period in which a great movement of thought is exhibited and that too on a large and conspicuous stage england france germany form its settings it begins with locke and is completed in kant and whatever significance kant may possess for the philosophical world to day attaches also to this period for this period served to open the way for the critical philosophy of the great master which is its appropriate culmination moreover the practical influences of the philosophical discussions of this age are of such extent and importance as to engage the attention of the ordinary reader of history as well as that of the more special worker in the field of philosophy in england religious controversy political theory and moral standards were profoundly affected by the philosophical tendencies of the day in france the social and political doctrines became involved with the philosophical and they were not without a dominating influence upon the popular mind not only throughout the period preceding the french revolution but also during the years of its progress as well in germany the same tendencies manifested themselves in theological controversy on the one hand and in the quickening of poetical insight and interpretation on the other so that poets became philosophers and philosophers became poets the movement of philosophical thought in this age moreover is typical of great movements of thought generally and in this aspect

is both illuminating and suggestive as a representative historical study the tendencies which here prevail the characteristic differences in point of view as well as the complementary relation of opposed opinions are all repeated again and again in the various political social religious moral and philosophical controversies which emerge through every significant period in the history of thought

this book is well calculated to bring about the long awaited breakthrough in the appreciation of virginia woolf as an intellectual author a o frank argues that in woolf s mature novels we find a coherent body of philosophical thought presented in lyrical prose which is nonetheless precisely argued in sections of meticulously precise close reading frank analyzes the complex mechanisms of textual engineering through which woolf s ideas find expression educated in the german continental tradition of aesthetics and philosophy the author believes that for a thought to be thought out properly it needs to be thought out philosophically speaking from a fruitfully intermediate position between british and continental culture she highlights and explicates woolf s philosophical thought by analyzing carefully selected passages from existential cosmological and epistemological texts by nietzsche as well as heidegger the later wittgenstein and derrida

peter schouls examines the role played by the concepts of freedom mastery and progress in descartes writings arguing that these ideas express a vital and fundamental feature of descartes thought these theories also occupy a central position in the thought of the enlightenment since the more contentious claim is that they function centrally in descartes works schouls presents a careful and detailed examination of the conjunction and use of these ideas in descartes writings this examination warrants the conclusion that they play the same role in descartes works as they do in writings typical of the enlightenment

karl leonhard reinhold 1757 1823 is a complex figure of the late german enlightenment sometime catholic priest and active mason even when still a cleric in vienna early disciple of kant and the first to try to reform the critique of reason influential teacher and prolific author astute commentator on the immediate post kantian scene and at all times convinced propagandist of the enlightenment in all these roles reinhold reflected his age but also tested the limits of the values that had inspired it this collection of essays originally presented at an international workshop held in montreal in 2007 conveys this multifaceted figure of reinhold in all its details in the four themes that run across the contributions the historicity of reason the primacy of moral praxis the personalism of religious belief and the transformation of classical metaphysics into phenomenology of mind reinhold is presented as a catalyst of nineteenth century thought but also as one who remained bound to intellectual prejudices that were typical of the enlightenment and for this reason as still the representative of a past age the volume contains the text of two hitherto unpublished masonic speeches by reinhold and a description of recently recovered transcripts of student lecture notes dating to reinhold s early jena period

in this reissue originally published in english in 1973 french philosopher lucien goldmann turns his attention to the enlightenment of the eighteenth century the great age of liberalism and individualism and analyses the mental structures of the outlook of the philosophes who showed that the ancien regime and the privileges of the church were irrational anachronisms in assessing the strengths and limitations of individualism goldmann considers the achievements and limitations of the enlightenment he discusses the views of hegel and marx and examines the relation between liberal scepticism and traditional christianity to point the way to the possible reconciliation of the two seemingly incompatible world visions of east and west today

the age of enlightenment has often been portrayed as a dogmatic period on account of the veritable worship of reason and progress that characterized eighteenth century thinkers even today the philosophes are considered to have been completely dominated in their thinking by an optimism that leads to dogmatism and ultimately rationalism however on closer inspection such a conception seems untenable not only after careful study of the impact of scepticism on numerous intellectual domains in the period but also as a result of a better understanding of the character of the enlightenment as giorgio tonelli has rightly observed the enlightenment was indeed the age of reason but one of

the main tasks assigned to reason in that age was to set its own boundaries thus given the growing number of works devoted to the scepticism of enlightenment thinkers historians of philosophy have become increasingly aware of the role played by scepticism in the eighteenth century even in those places once thought to be most given to dogmatism especially germany nevertheless the deficiencies of current studies of enlightenment scepticism are undeniable in taking up this question in particular the present volume which is entirely devoted to the scepticism of the enlightenment in both its historical and geographical dimensions seeks to provide readers with a reevaluation of the alleged decline of scepticism at the same time it attempts to resituate the pyrrhonian heritage within its larger context and to recapture the fundamental issues at stake the aim is to construct an alternative conception of enlightenment philosophy by means of philosophical modernity itself whose initial stages can be found herein

taking as its focus the wide ranging character of the enlightenment both in geographical and intellectual terms this second collection of articles by john gascoigne explores this movement s filiation and influence in a range of contexts in contrast to some recently influential views it emphasises the evolutionary rather than the revolutionary character of the enlightenment and its ability to change society by adaptation rather than demolition this it does by reference firstly to developments in britain tracing the changing views of history in relation to the biblical account the ideological uses of science and particularly the work of newton and their connections to developments in moral philosophy and the teaching of science and philosophy in response to enlightenment modes of thought the collection then turns to the wider global setting of the enlightenment and the way in which that movement served to provide a justification for european exploration and expansion developments which found one of their most potent embodiments in the diverse uses of mapping the collection concludes with an exploration of the interplay between the experience of pacific contact and the currents of thought which characterised the enlightenment in germany

three tasks direct the author s work to establish from available sources the circumstances in life the mental development and the doctrines of individual philosophers to reconstruct from these facts the genetic process so that the effect of these factors upon each philosopher s doctrine can be determined to determine the overall value in the history of philosophy of the doctrines considering their origin

the omnidoxy is the founding treatise of the astronist religion and was solely

authored by the philosopher and religious founder cometan partitioned into twelve disquisitions each of which are further divided into hundreds of discourses which are themselves titled by those which are known as rubrals the omnidoxy has been codified according to a unique writing structure known as insentence the omnidoxy not only forms the foundations of astronism but it remains the primary modern contributor and the book that ignited the establishment of the astronic tradition of religion which encompasses the philosophy of astronism introducing brand new philosophical concepts such as cosmocentricity reascensionism transcensionism and sentientism amongst many others the omnidoxy remains the principal signifier of a new era in philosophy the omnidoxy births hundreds of new belief orientations schools of thought neologisms disciplines of study theories and concepts which when combined and considered collectively have formed the basis of astronism the authorship of the omnidoxy rests with the single individual philosopher cometan who began writing the omnidoxy at the age of seventeen driven by what he terms as personal inspiration the historical origination of the omnidoxy rests in its authorship by brandon taylorian during early 21st century england specifically in the northern county of lancashire like in all textual criticism the timing and location of the codification of the omnidoxy is integral to understanding why and how it was written especially by considering the influential factors impacting taylorian during his construction of the text particularly the cultural political religious and social contexts of taylorian s personal life and of wider society at the time this forms an important branch of study within omnidoxicology known as omnidoxical criticism or omnidoxical exegesis in which scholars study and investigate the omnidoxy in order to discern conclusive judgements inspired by how where why by whom for whom and in what circumstances the omnidoxy was written

this book extends the approach that murray and schuler develop in their companion volume false moves in philosophy and social theory losing public purpose the chapters form a connected inquiry into consequences of capital a far reaching social form through a critique of political economy and the mindset it shares with much modern philosophy and social theory the authors call this bifurcating mentality factoring philosophy factoring philosophy mistakes the distinguishable for the separable it splits the subjective and objective form and content and it takes the object of social theory to be an impossible economy in general stripped of constitutive social forms the critique of factoring philosophy structures the collection which makes a wide ranging contribution to the research field of the critique of political economy as critical social theory

ultimately this book solidifies murray and schuler s impact on the study of political economy political philosophy modern philosophy hegel marx and critical theory

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
